

VOTERS BEHAVIOUR AND VOTING PATTERNS IN THE 2023 GENERAL ELECTIONS IN NIGERIA

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Abstract

This paper critically examines voting patterns and voter behaviour in Nigeria's 2023 general elections through a qualitative analysis grounded in secondary data sources. Drawing on the rational choice theory, the study explores how individual voters made electoral decisions based on calculated self-interest, perceived benefits, and available political alternatives. The research is guided by three central questions: (1) What were the dominant patterns of voter behaviour in the 2023 general elections? (2) To what extent did socio-economic, ethnic, and regional factors influence voting decisions? (3) How does the rational choice model explain deviations from expected voting trends? The objectives of this study are to identify and explain emerging trends in electoral behaviour, interrogate the role of contextual variables such as ethnicity, political economy, and party ideology in shaping voter decisions, and assess the explanatory power of rational choice theory in the Nigerian electoral context. Methodologically, the study adopts a qualitative approach, relying on critical content analysis of reports from electoral observers, scholarly articles, policy briefs, media coverage, and official data from the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC). By avoiding interviews and questionnaires, the research maintains a reflective distance that enhances analytical rigor and triangulation of documented evidence. Anchored in the rational choice framework, the study contends that while Nigerian voters exhibited elements of instrumental rationality, these were often mediated by structural constraints such as limited political alternatives, pervasive clientelism, and identity-based mobilization. The 2023 elections revealed both continuity and change: persistent regional voting blocs coexisted with a significant youth-driven movement that challenged traditional political hierarchies. The paper concludes by recommending institutional reforms to enhance voter education, transparency in electoral processes, and the creation of issue-based political platforms. These interventions are necessary to deepen democratic consolidation and recalibrate voter behaviour towards more programmatic, rather than parochial, electoral engagement.

Introduction

The 2023 general elections in Nigeria were pivotal in shaping the nation's political future. As one of the largest democracies in Africa, Nigeria's electoral processes attract significant attention, both domestically and internationally. The 2023 elections presented a crucial moment to evaluate the changing patterns of voting behavior and the socio-political dynamics that influenced voters' decisions. This paper seeks to explore these voting patterns and behaviors, delving into the various issues and events that shaped the electorate's choices. Nigeria has a complex political environment characterized by a multi-party system, ethnic diversity, and a history of political instability. Despite these challenges, the country has witnessed a

growing trend toward democratic consolidation, particularly since the return to civilian rule in 1999. The 2023 elections were therefore a critical test of Nigeria's democratic institutions and electoral systems, which have been the subject of reforms aimed at improving voter participation, ensuring fairness, and reducing electoral malpractice (Alemika, 2011).

The 2023 elections were held against the backdrop of a turbulent political environment. The economy was grappling with inflation, rising unemployment, and security challenges, particularly in the northeastern and north-central regions of the country, where insurgency and banditry were prevalent. These challenges were compounded by the global economic downturn, which affected the living standards of Nigerians. As such, the electorate's priorities were not only shaped by ideological preferences but also by immediate, pressing concerns about security, economic stability, and the future of the nation.

Voting behavior refers to the reasons why people vote the way they do, and it is shaped by numerous factors, including socioeconomic background, ethnicity, religion, and political alignment. In Nigeria, voting patterns have historically been influenced by ethnic and regional loyalties, with voters often identifying with candidates who represent their ethnic or regional group. This trend was evident in the 2023 elections, where candidates from the southern and northern parts of the country garnered significant support from their respective regions (Omotola, 2010). However, there were signs of a shift in voter behavior, particularly among younger Nigerians, who were more concerned with issues of governance, transparency, and the economy rather than purely ethnic or religious considerations (Agbaje, 2019).

The rise of social media and the increasing participation of young Nigerians in political discourse also influenced voting behavior. For the first time in Nigeria's electoral history, social media played a significant role in political mobilization and the dissemination of information (Sani, 2023). The youth, especially those within the 18-35 age group, became a powerful force, mobilizing both on-ground and online to demand change in the political status quo. This demographic was highly engaged in the elections, with many voting for candidates they believed would address issues such as job creation, corruption, and national unity. However, despite the enthusiasm of this demographic, the overall voter turnout remained low, suggesting that while many Nigerians were politically aware, there were still significant barriers to full electoral participation, including the credibility of the electoral process and logistical challenges (Shittu, 2022).

Several issues dominated the 2023 elections and played a significant role in influencing voters' decisions. The economy, characterized by high inflation and unemployment rates, was a major concern for many Nigerians. A large portion of the electorate sought a candidate who could promise economic revitalization, job creation, and the stabilization of the naira. Security, particularly in the northern and central regions, also featured prominently in the political discourse. Candidates who were seen as capable of effectively combating insurgency and banditry garnered considerable support from voters in those areas (Ibrahim, 2021).

Corruption remained a central issue in Nigerian politics, and many voters were keen on electing leaders who could tackle the country's deep-seated corruption problems. The call for

transparency and accountability was loud and clear, with many voters prioritizing candidates who pledged to implement reforms to fight corruption and strengthen democratic institutions (Olaniyi, 2022).

Ethnic and religious considerations were also prevalent in the 2023 elections, as Nigeria is a deeply plural society. Voters were often drawn to candidates who represented their ethnic or religious group, which sometimes led to the reinforcement of regional divisions. However, some candidates, particularly from the youth-led movements, attempted to transcend these ethnic lines by focusing on issues that resonated with Nigerians from all regions, including better governance and development.

The 2023 general elections were not without controversy and challenges. The role of the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) was scrutinized throughout the electoral process, particularly regarding its preparedness to manage the new biometric voter registration system and its ability to ensure a free and fair election. The introduction of the Bimodal Voter Accreditation System (BVAS) and the INEC Results Viewing Portal (IReV) were significant steps towards improving transparency and reducing electoral fraud (Sani, 2023). However, there were concerns about the reliability of these systems, especially after reports of delays in uploading results and challenges with BVAS during the election.

Additionally, incidents of violence and electoral malpractice were reported in some regions, raising questions about the security of the election process and the extent to which political thuggery influenced the outcome. Despite these issues, the 2023 elections were viewed as a step forward in Nigeria's democratic journey, offering a glimpse of the potential for a more inclusive and transparent electoral system in the future (Bello, 2023).

The 2023 general elections in Nigeria were marked by significant shifts in voting patterns and voter behavior. The issues surrounding security, the economy, corruption, and the role of social media played crucial roles in shaping the choices of the electorate. (Tajfel & Turner, 1986). In the context of Nigeria's 2023 elections, these theories help elucidate issues such as regionalism, ethnicity, and personal interest in the voting process.

The 2023 elections occurred against the backdrop of a turbulent political history enveloped in ethnic rivalry and economic challenges. As highlighted by Akinyemi and Orunmuyi (2023), the previous elections were marred by substantial violence and allegations of electoral malpractices, which laid a foundation for heightened voter sensitivity regarding electoral integrity in 2023 (Akinyemi & Orunmuyi, 2023). Numerous studies indicate that socio-economic status plays a vital role in shaping voter behavior. Olatunji and Benita (2023) argue that economic hardship and unemployment have a direct correlation with voter turnout; those suffering economically are less likely to participate in elections. They further assert that economic conditions significantly influenced the choice candidates, as voters sought representatives who promised economic relief (Olatunji & Benita, 2023).

Additionally, education levels were found to affect voter engagement. A study by Emeka and Ajayi (2023) noted that higher education correlates positively with informed voting behavior. They emphasized that educated voters tend to evaluate candidates on a broader spectrum of policies rather than tribal or ethnic affiliations (Emeka & Ajayi, 2023). Nigeria's diverse ethnic makeup has always played a significant role in its politics. The 2023 elections witnessed a continuation of ethnic voting patterns, with solid candidates emerging from regions with cohesive ethnic support bases. According to Okafor (2023), regional identity heavily influenced voter behavior, leading to substantial blocks of votes based on ethnicity rather than party lines. This phenomenon reflects longstanding socio-political divisions within the country (Okafor, 2023).

With the rise of digital platforms, the role of social media and technology in influencing voter behavior cannot be overstated. A study by Ibe and Salami (2023) found that social media significantly impacted voter awareness and engagement, especially among younger demographics. Their research indicated that online campaigns and digital outreach played a crucial role in shaping voters' perceptions and ultimately swayed voting patterns (Ibe & Salami, 2023). However, misinformation and disinformation proliferated through these platforms, complicating voters' ability to make informed decisions. According to Ndidi (2023), the spread of false information undermined the electoral process and contributed to voter apathy among some groups. He emphasizes the need for regulatory frameworks to combat misinformation during elections (Ndidi, 2023).

The psychological context of voting is essential for understanding voter motivations. Obasi and Osei (2023) explored how fear and anxiety shaped voter decisions in the 2023 elections. Their findings suggest that fears related to insecurity and economic stability drove voters to support candidates promising immediate relief, thus impacting voter turnout and preferences (Obasi & Osei, 2023). In addition, the emotional resonance of candidates' campaigns played a crucial role. For instance, candidates who successfully communicated empathy and understanding towards the challenges faced by ordinary citizens garnered more support than those who focused on grandiose promises (Ugochukwu & Daniels, 2023).

Political campaigns in Nigeria have evolved, particularly with the introduction of modern campaign strategies. Adesola and Sulaimon (2023) argue that successful campaigns hinged not only on traditional canvassing but also on strategic messaging tailored to specific demographics. They found that campaigns which effectively utilized data analytics to target voters based on socio-economic status and geographic location performed significantly better (Adesola & Sulaimon, 2023). Conversely, campaigns perceived as elitist or disconnected from the rural populace struggled to secure votes. The authors point out the importance of grassroots engagement in ensuring electoral success (Adesola & Sulaimon, 2023).

The 2023 general elections in Nigeria represented a complex interplay of socio-economic, ethnic, psychological, and technological factors that shaped voter behavior and patterns. As Nigeria continues to navigate its political landscape, understanding these dynamics will be essential for future elections. This literature review highlights the critical need for continued research into electoral behavior, focusing on the emerging trends and historical contexts that influence democracy in Nigeria.

It seeks to provide a nuanced analysis that integrates psychological and behavioral aspects, thereby offering insights into how these variables shaped electoral outcomes in Nigeria's rapidly evolving political landscape.

Theoretical Framework

Rational Choice Theory (RCT) provides a useful lens for understanding voting behavior, particularly in elections where individuals are motivated by self-interest, strategic calculations, and the weighing of costs and benefits (Downs, 1957). In the context of the 2023 elections in Nigeria, Rational Choice Theory can help explain why voters made the decisions they did, particularly when confronted with multiple candidates offering differing solutions to pressing political, economic, and social issues.

Rational Choice Theory posits that individuals make decisions by evaluating the potential outcomes and selecting the option that maximizes their perceived benefits while minimizing costs. This framework is applicable to voting behavior because voters are assumed to be rational actors who evaluate candidates based on their platforms, policy proposals, and the perceived benefits these would bring to their personal or group interests. For example, a voter in a region heavily affected by insecurity may choose a candidate who promises better security measures, while a voter struggling with unemployment may vote for a candidate who prioritizes job creation.

The application of RCT in the context of the 2023 Nigerian elections highlights how voters' decisions were often driven by tangible outcomes that directly affected their lives. Agbaje (2019) argues that the increasing influence of younger voters in Nigeria reflects a shift towards more issue-based voting, with the electorate prioritizing candidates who can offer real solutions

to Nigeria's problems, such as economic hardship and insecurity, rather than relying on traditional party loyalties or ethnic considerations. This behavior aligns with the principles of RCT, where voters are seen as calculating the expected benefits of their choices.

In the context of political parties, Rational Choice Theory can also be used to examine how political parties and candidates strategize to maximize their electoral chances. According to Downs (1957), political parties act in a way that maximizes their votes by appealing to the preferences of voters. In Nigeria, party strategies in the 2023 elections focused on addressing key issues such as security, the economy, and corruption. The parties and candidates tailored their campaigns to resonate with voters' perceived needs, attempting to present themselves as the most viable option for securing the country's future.

The literature on voting patterns and voter behavior in Nigeria reveals a complex interplay of factors, including ethnicity, economic conditions, and media influence. Rational Choice Theory provides a solid framework for understanding how voters in the 2023 general elections made decisions based on strategic calculations of self-interest. This theoretical approach helps explain why voters supported candidates who offered tangible solutions to pressing issues such as economic hardship and insecurity. As the Nigerian electorate continues to evolve, future studies on voting behavior will need to further explore the role of Rational Choice Theory in shaping the democratic process, especially as younger, more informed voters become an increasingly powerful force in Nigerian politics.

Future studies could delve deeper into understanding how specific economic indicators impact voter sentiment and preferences across different regions. Additionally, political candidates and parties must recognize the importance of developing comprehensive economic policies that address the electorate's immediate needs. Engaging with communities to understand their economic challenges and integrating these insights into campaign strategies can create a more responsive political platform.

The fragmentation observed among established political parties highlights the need for further investigation into the causes and consequences of this trend. As voters express disillusionment with traditional party structures, emerging political movements provide an opportunity for studying alternative governance models and their acceptance among the populace (Odugbemi & Odukoya, 2023). Researchers should explore the factors that contribute to the rise of new political parties and assess their potential to disrupt the political landscape. Practically, existing political parties must reevaluate their internal structures and responsiveness to community concerns to regain public trust. Engaging in constructive dialogue with constituents can help mitigate the risks of fragmentation and promote party cohesion.

The impact of security challenges on voter turnout underscores the urgent need for research focused on the relationship between security and electoral participation. Areas with high levels of violence experienced a notable decline in voter turnout, suggesting that safety remains a critical barrier to democratic engagement (Human Rights Watch, 2023). Future research should investigate the effectiveness of various security measures implemented during elections and their influence on voter behavior. Practitioners, including electoral bodies and governmental organizations, must prioritize creating safe environments for voters. This can involve establishing partnerships with security agencies to ensure that polling stations are secure and that voters feel safe exercising their rights.

The 2023 elections illustrated the significant role of media, particularly social media, in shaping public perceptions and influencing voter behavior. The rapid dissemination of information, both accurate and misleading, raises concerns about the quality of political discourse (Odugbemi & Odukoya, 2023). Research aimed at understanding the effects of misinformation on voter decisions is critical for developing strategies to combat it. Additionally, the media's responsibility in ensuring balanced and fact-based reporting should be emphasized. Practically, electoral commissions and civil society organizations should design media literacy programs that educate voters on identifying credible information and countering misinformation.

The implications of the findings from the 2023 general elections in Nigeria extend across research and practice. Understanding the dynamics of youth engagement, economic priorities, party fragmentation, security concerns, and media influence is crucial for fostering effective electoral processes. Future research should focus on these areas to provide actionable insights that can enhance administrative practices and political strategies. By recognizing the changing

landscape of voter behavior, electoral stakeholders can work towards a more inclusive, responsive, and secure democratic process that reflects the values and concerns of the electorate.

The 2023 general elections in Nigeria represent a significant turning point in the country's democratic journey. This paper has analyzed voting patterns and voter behavior, focusing on the issues and events that shaped the electoral choices of Nigerians. The findings reveal that, while traditional factors such as ethnicity and religion continued to influence voting decisions, a notable shift was observed in the electorate's behavior, particularly among the youth. The 2023 elections highlighted a growing trend of issue-based voting, where voters prioritized governance, economic concerns, and security over ethnic or regional loyalty.

One of the key drivers of voter behavior was the economic situation in Nigeria. With rising inflation, unemployment, and economic instability, many voters sought candidates who offered concrete solutions to the country's economic woes. The electorate's concerns were reflected in the prominence of economic reform agendas in political campaigns. This issue, combined with the security challenges facing the nation, particularly in the northern and central regions, led to a shift in voter priorities. Candidates who focused on improving security and restoring law and order gained significant support, particularly in regions affected by insurgency and banditry.

Another important factor in the 2023 elections was the role of social media and digital platforms in mobilizing and informing voters, particularly younger Nigerians. Social media emerged as a powerful tool for political campaigns, information dissemination, and voter engagement. The increasing involvement of youth in the political process, often through online platforms, marked a departure from traditional political participation methods. This demographic was crucial in challenging the existing political order and pushing for change, with many voters prioritizing policies that focused on economic development, transparency, and good governance.

Despite these shifts, the elections also underscored the continuing challenges in Nigeria's electoral system. Issues such as voter apathy, electoral malpractice, and the integrity of the electoral process, particularly concerning the use of technology in voting, were prevalent throughout the election cycle. Although the reforms introduced by the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), such as the Bimodal Voter Accreditation System (BVAS), aimed to improve transparency, technical issues and irregularities affected the smooth conduct of the elections, leading to concerns over the credibility of the process.

In conclusion, the 2023 general elections in Nigeria reflect an evolving electoral landscape characterized by a mix of traditional factors and new dynamics. While ethnicity and religion still play a role, the growing influence of economic issues, security concerns, and social media is reshaping voter behavior. These elections also highlighted the challenges of conducting free, fair, and credible elections in a complex socio-political environment. Future elections will require continued efforts to improve electoral integrity, address security concerns, and foster greater political engagement, especially among the youth. This study provides a foundation for

further research into the evolving nature of Nigerian democracy and the factors that shape voter behavior.

Recommendations

Based on the analysis of voting patterns and voter behavior in the 2023 general elections in Nigeria, several recommendations can be made to improve the electoral process and ensure more effective, inclusive, and transparent future elections. These recommendations address key issues that emerged from the study, including voter participation, electoral integrity, and the evolving role of digital media in politics.

One of the persistent challenges in Nigeria's electoral process is voter apathy, particularly among young people. Despite high engagement on social media, many eligible voters do not fully understand the voting process or the importance of their participation. To address this, the government, civil society organizations, and political parties should prioritize voter education campaigns. These campaigns should focus on explaining the voting process, the significance of elections, and the importance of informed decision-making. Special attention should be given to the youth demographic, as they represent a growing proportion of the electorate but often lack adequate information about the electoral system.

Although reforms have been made to Nigeria's electoral process, including the introduction of the Bimodal Voter Accreditation System (BVAS) and the Results Viewing Portal (IReV), the credibility of the elections remains a concern. There were reports of irregularities, delayed results, and technical failures, which eroded public trust in the electoral process. To improve transparency and integrity, further investment in electoral technology is essential, ensuring that systems are reliable and foolproof. Additionally, strengthening the role of election observers and civil society groups can help provide independent monitoring and ensure the credibility of the elections.

While voting behavior in the 2023 elections demonstrated a shift toward issue-based voting, ethnic and religious loyalties still played a significant role. To reduce ethnic and religious tensions, political parties should focus on building inclusive campaigns that appeal to the diverse interests of the Nigerian populace. Political candidates should strive to present policies and solutions that address the needs of all regions and groups, promoting national unity. Additionally, political education should be strengthened to encourage voters to make decisions based on policy and governance rather than ethnic or religious identity.

The 2023 elections demonstrated the increasing role of social media and digital platforms in mobilizing voters, especially the youth. Given the substantial influence of social media, political campaigns should harness digital tools more effectively to engage younger voters. This can be done through targeted campaigns on platforms like Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram, focusing on the key issues that resonate with the youth, such as employment, economic opportunities, and good governance. Encouraging political discussions on these platforms can also foster a more informed electorate and increase voter turnout.

Security remains a major concern in Nigeria, particularly in regions affected by insurgency and banditry. The 2023 elections saw violence and intimidation in some areas, which undermined

the peaceful conduct of the election. To ensure a safe and secure electoral environment, the government must strengthen security measures during elections, ensuring the protection of voters, election workers, and polling stations. Collaboration with security agencies, the military, and local communities is crucial to ensuring that elections can be conducted peacefully in all regions.

Finally, the Nigerian government must continue to strengthen electoral reforms and legislation to address gaps in the current system. This includes improving the capacity of the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), enhancing the legal framework for election dispute resolution, and ensuring the enforcement of electoral laws. Clearer and more effective legal measures are essential to reducing electoral malpractice and enhancing public confidence in the electoral process.

The 2023 general elections in Nigeria represented a significant moment in the country's democratic evolution, marked by shifts in voter behavior and increased youth participation. However, challenges remain, particularly in terms of voter apathy, electoral integrity, and regional divisions. By implementing the recommendations outlined above, Nigeria can continue to build a more inclusive, transparent, and accountable electoral process, ensuring that future elections reflect the true will of the Nigerian people.

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
